When should interested applicants visit? What does a visit look like?

A visit usually consists of a day in clinic with both the fellowship directors. They are exposed to the wide variety of preoperative and post operative patients that are scheduled. There is usually some time to discuss surgical cases during this visit

What is the interview process like at your program?

At our program, there is usually one academic and one social interview.

Do you have a co-fellow? What percentage of your cases are scrubbed with them?

I am the only fellow.

What support is available for finding post-fellowship employment?

Both the directors are national speakers and well connected. They make an active effort to help the fellow find a job. They also provide feedback regarding contract negotiations

What qualities make an applicant a good fit for your program?

Hard working, positive attitude, academically sound, able to take constructive criticism, honest and have a thirst to learn.

Why did you apply for fellowship? And why did you choose your fellowship program?

I applied for fellowship as my residency lacked sheer number of reconstructive cases.

I needed more experience with complex surgical cases.

Any advice for future fellowship applicants?

Fellowship is a massive commitment. Before applying, I would advise the applicant to ask themselves where they would like to see themselves in ten years and then find a fellowship which helps you attain those goals. Also, there is no substitute for hard work!
